2017-2018 District 6740 Grants

Together we make a difference, both large and small, and always for the better, in the lives of others in our communities and the world.

The following sixteen clubs applied for and received grants to improve the lives of others in their communities, for a total of \$20,700 in District Designated Funds.

Ashland – Education: literacy. 500 third-grade students in Boyd County receive their own dictionary

**Corbin** – Health: general. Provide shoes and blankets for 500 children in need in the Corbin area

**Covington** – RI Youth programs. Supplement costs of Youth Exchange

**Georgetown** – Education: literacy. Third-grade students receive a dictionary and fourth grade students in Georgetown receive a thesaurus. 1600 students

**Grayson** – Health: general. Provide repaired bicycles to 75 Carter County residents for exercise and transportation

Lexington – Education: general. Graduation celebration for 40 disadvantaged children, supply backpack of school supplies and a watch to each student

London - Education: literacy. Provide a dictionary to 800 third-grade students in Laurel County

Louisa – Community development: general.

Replace inappropriate trees causing sidewalk damage and pedestrian hazards in Louisa for the health of the environment and the community

Florence – Peace: general.

Generate goodwill and friendships in the community with 390 first responders and law enforcement personnel at recognition lunch

Paris – Health: general.

Provide backpack meals for 375 children in Bourbon County to ensure adequate food and nutrition on weekends and school breaks

Paintsville – Community development: general.

Develop a community produce garden with Rotarians and community volunteers. Distribute harvest to needy citizens in the community

Pikeville – Health: disease.

Physical fitness program to target underserved children in Pike County and the problems of being obese and overweight with an after school program for 75 youth

**Richmond** – Education: literacy. Provide a dictionary to each third-grade student in Madison County. 400 students

Whitesburg – Education: literacy.

The Dolly Parton Imagination Library will expand by 75 children in Letcher County, where children are considered at risk due to social and economic characteristics of the community

Maysville – Community development: construction/renovation. Improve Rotary Park by installing new fencing which will provide a safer and more attractive environment. Expand the grill area for 17,190 residents of Mason County

Congratulations to these clubs who see a need in their community and set about doing something about it.

Remember...when you donate to the Rotary Foundation annual fund, 50% of the money returns to the district to fund District Designated Fund Grants.

On Saturday, June 16, the Flemingsburg Rotary Club hosted several young people from the community on a trip to Lexington for a night of food, fun, and fellowship. Four rotary club members, four friends of Rotary, ten local young people, and one bus driver left Fleming County High School at 3:30 Saturday afternoon. They arrived just north of Lexington at 5:00 at the newly constructed Bluegrass Stockyards on Iron Works Pike. There they were met by former Fleming County High School graduate Laura Lee Crain, who gave them a tour of the facility, as well as a history lesson about the origins of the stockyards and its ties to Fleming County. Then the group enjoyed a delicious supper catered by the stockyards restaurant catering staff, before boarding the bus again for the short trip up Iron Works Pike to the Kentucky Horse Park, to attend the Lexington Rotary Club's annual Pro Rodeo event at Alltech Arena. The group saw bare back riding, calf roping, saddle bronc riding, steer wrestling, team roping, barrel racing, and of course, bull riding. In addition, the crowd was entertained with trick riders and the comedy of the Rodeo Clown. The highlight of the evening for most was the mutton busting event, as well as the calf chase. In this event, around 50-60 kids age 11-12 chased three calves around the arena trying to grab the ribbon tied to their tails. The winners received cash prizes. The Rodeo ended around 10:30 pm and the group boarded the buses for the sleepy ride back to Flemingsburg. The Flemingsburg Rotary club would like to say a big Thank You to Mendy High of the Fleming County Youth Service center for helping us identify the young people who attended, as well as the Fleming County School district for allowing us the use of the bus. Finally, thanks to our bus driver Johnny Vise, for getting us to and from the Rodeo safely. A good time was had by all.
