Exhibit Celebrates 150 Years of Art Academy of Cincinnati

The current exhibit at the Cincinnati Museum of Art in Eden Park is a self-portrait of sorts.

“Art Academy of Cincinnati at 150: A Celebration of Drawings and Prints” showcases the works of faculty and alumni of the Art Academy of Cincinnati over the past 1 ½ centuries. The 90 drawings and prints on display are drawn from collections at the museum, which enjoyed a working partnership with the academy from 1884 to 1998.

Established as a teaching institute, the museum has collected 67,000 works of art spanning 6,000 years since the collaboration with the art academy began.

“We’re different from other museums,” said Carrie Atkins Maras, associate director of community engagement for the museum. “We’re keeping collections for the next generation.”

Maras presented a preview of “Academy 150” and provided a history of the museum center’s relationship with the art academy at a recent meeting of the Florence Rotary Club.

What makes the museum different is the longstanding relationship with the art academy and emphasis on permanent collections, according to Maras. Most museums today feature modern art and changing exhibits.

The art academy moved into a building adjacent to the museum in 1887 and operated as a museum school under the auspices of the Cincinnati Museum Association. The academy left the partnership in 1998 to become an independent college of art and design and moved into a new campus in Over-The-Rhine.

Academic figure studies from the collaborative years feature prominently in the acade-

my exhibit, which runs through April 28. The exhibit includes still life, portrait and landscape prints and drawings from such well-known artists as Frank Duveneck, Elizabeth Nourse, Charley Harper and Tom Shaw.

Maras also previewed a traveling exhibit entitled “Paris 1900: City of Entertainment,” which will open March 1. The show will not only feature art works from Renoir and Toulouse-Lautrec, but also fashions, furniture and posters from Paris at the turn of the 20th century.

“All that variety will give you a real sense of the culture at that time,” Maras said.

The museum center continues to grow its collections through different ways. Curators identify the best examples of art works in their content and how to obtain them. Sometimes the museum is willing “to deactivate and sell something or trade something to get something better to fill a hole.”

“It’s like a game of monopoly,” Maras noted.
