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Human Services Meets Homeless Where They Live

The Boone County Human Services Department provides assistance to the homeless by meeting them where they live: on the streets. Boone County does not have a homeless shelter. So, the human services department partnered with Welcome House of Northern Kentucky in Covington two years ago to pilot a street outreach program called Open Door.

The model, medical program teams a social worker, nurse practitioner and mental health provider to work with Boone County communities to help the homeless population, according to Laura Pleiman, the county's human services director. "It's gone well," she said. "It since has been joined by Kenton and Campbell counties."

The street outreach initiative was among the innovative human services programs Pleiman outlined at a recent meeting of the Rotary Club of Florence. Her department oversees distribution of payroll tax funds that support mental health, intellectual disability and aging services in coordination with more than 30 agencies.

Everyone who works in Boone County must pay the tax, which caps at \$25 per year. The human services department provided more than 16,000 meals, 7,600 prescriptions, 1,700 nights of emergency shelter, 2,300 hours of counseling in schools and 156,000 hours of community work services in fiscal year 2018, according to data cited by Pleiman.

Open Door is an example of how the department works collaboratively with other organizations to maximize services, she said. The street outreach team searches for homeless people, builds relationships with them and connects them with resources to address their physical and emotional needs. Thanks to a grant, the program will purchase a recreational vehicle outfitted with a medical equipment this fall, Pleiman said.

"We are fortunate to have innovative programming in Boone County," she said.

Boone County began participating in a Northern Kentucky adult oral health program this year. The county collaborates with the Northern Kentucky Health Department and private partners to assist people with severe dental needs who lack dental insurance.

The human services department also has teamed with local companies to provide meals for needy county residents and transportation to take senior citizens to Boone County activities. In addition, the department oversees the Boone County Youth Cabinet and pauper burials.

The Boone County Tax Board screens the department's funding allocations each year and forwards recommendations to the fiscal court, which makes the final decisions. The amount allocated to each of the three primary areas - mental health, intellectual disability and aging - varies each year based on changes in need in the county.

"Mental health has really taken off" this year, Pleiman said.
