Animals Rule the Road in South Africa

If you plan to travel in South Africa, don't drive a red vehicle through a Game Reserve.

Elephants and rhinoceros don't like them.

"If you have a red car, stay very far away from them," said Neville Buchanan. "I have seen rhinos charging cars several times."

Buchanan gave members of the Florence Rotary Club a travelogue of his recent adventures in South Africa at a recent meeting.

Buchanan is a licensed clinical pastoral counselor and professional clinical member with the National Christian Counselors Association. He also is the pulpit minister at Summit Church of Christ in Cold Spring.

A native of South Africa, Buchanan moved to the United States in the late 1990s. He said he returns to his homeland every seven years.

"I always come back feeling the same ... rested," Buchanan said. "It's so wonderful to get away from the humdrum of life."

Buchanan said the first place he usually visits is a game reserve because the adventure and the sights are very relaxing ... if you don't upset the animals. He showed two viral internet videos to illustrate what happens if you don't follow the rules of engagement with animals.

In one video an elephant stomps on the hood of a car, sits on it and then tries to puncture a tire with its tusks. In the other, a rhino flipped a car several times with the horn on the front of its head.

Buchanan also showed video and photographs of his travels through the Hluhluwe-Imfolozi game reserve in the Kwazulu-Natal Province of South Africa. A herd of elephants crosses the trail stop-

ping traffic in one of his videos, and one of the elephants aggressively ambles toward Buchanan's vehicle.

When an elephant shakes its ears, you are in trouble, Buchanan observed. When the elephant in the video began shaking its ears, a member of the audience exclaimed, "Uh-oh!"

"That's what I said," Buchanan noted, chuckling.

"The game reserve belongs to the animals," he said earlier. "It's a huge area dedicated to animals."

Buchanan showed pictures he shot of monkeys, hyenas, wild dogs and a giraffe. He said people rarely see the wild dogs because they hunt at night.

"The wild dogs are the best hunters in South Africa because they hunt in packs," he pointed out. "They'll take down an elephant; they'll take down a lion."

Travelers must expect the unexpected and be prepared for anything on game reserves, Buchanan observed. For example, he left the lid on his tent open one morning. Several monkeys dropped in to see what they could steal, alarming members inside.

As they ate breakfast, a large majestic elephant strode across the plain in front of them.

"It's wonderful to think you can be eating and something like that happens," Buchanan said.

And apparently quite restful, too ... if you don't wear anything red.
